OFF THE TRAIL

As Director of the Alabama Tourism Department for the past 22 years, I am always proud to discuss one of Alabama's biggest tourism success stories.

The legendary Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail is world famous. Golfers travel from all over the world to play these exceptional courses. The Trail offers 450 holes on 11 sites, ranging from the tip of the Appalachians to the shores of Mobile Bay. Laced throughout the Trail are eight luxurious Marriott and Renaissance hotels, all designed to give golfers and other luxury seekers a four-star experience.

A perhaps equally interesting story is how this world-class but affordable golf experience came into being.

Dr. David G. Bronner, CEO of the Retirement Systems of Alabama, had a vision in the late 1980s that could strengthen the public employees' and teachers' pension funds through tourism, while strengthening the state's economy at the same time.

He intended to build a series of challenging public golf complexes to draw golfers from northern and southern states, along with their money, to Alabama throughout the year.

Dr. Bronner brought in the legendary golf course architect, Robert Trent Jones Sr., who came out of semi-retirement for the massive project. When he toured Alabama by helicopter, boat, and various other means, Jones Sr. and Bronner picked out some of the most exquisite sites ever imagined for a golf course. And this from a legendary designer who had already designed more than 500 of the world's greatest golf venues.

The rest, as they say, is history.

In 1996, Bronner knew he needed a way to promote the Trail to the rest of the U.S. So the RSA formed and funded Raycom Media, a collection of 65 television stations reaching about 11 percent of U.S. households, airing millions of dollars in TV commercials promoting the Trail and other Alabama attractions, including the U.S. Space & Rocket Center, the Alabama Gulf Coast, civil rights destinations, Black Belt Adventures, and more.

The marketing relationship continued when Raycom was sold to Gray Television, which includes 113 TV stations, reaching 36 percent of U.S. households.

Dr. Bronner's vision worked in a big way. Alabama's image changed from a pass through state to a must visit destination. Financially, no one can argue the success of the numbers. In 1993, Alabama tourism brought in \$1.8 billion. This year in 2024 Tourism will reach \$24.2 billion.

So grab your clubs, your family, or your buddies and head for Alabama's Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail. Come see why we call it "Sweet Home Alabama."



DAVID BRONNER AND THE RTJ GOLF TRAIL

In 1990, the state of Alabama was only a few decades removed from some of the most violent visuals of the Civil Rights Era. In fact, a mere four years earlier, George Wallace —known throughout the country primarily as a staunch 1960s segregationist — had not yet finished his fourth term as the state's governor. Those memories could not be easily erased from the national consciousness. But David Bronner, CEO of the Retirement Systems of Alabama, was determined to try to move the state past its reputation. He decided the best way to accomplish this was, of all things, to build a series of golf courses forming a sort of trail across the state. »





Nearly 35 years later, Bronner's vision has become one of the leading tourist attractions in Alabama. A total of approximately 750,000 rounds of golf are played at the 11 RTJ sites each year, and the Alabama Tourism Department has estimated that about half those rounds are by golfers who live outside the state.

"When we started the project, George Wallace was all some people knew about Alabama," Bronner says. "RTJ gave us the opportunity to talk about something else. I wanted to see if we could change the world's impression of Alabama through the use of a sport. I wanted something that would give us a constant flow of a positive image."

At first, Bronner simply was trying to come up with a way to effectively diversify the assets of the RSA pension fund. In the process, he decided he also wanted to help change the conversation away from Alabama's controversial past and instead focus on the state's attributes, namely as an outdoor recreation location for tourists and a business-friendly environment for industry.

"Back then, when recruiters in Alabama were looking to bring in industry, businesses still had visions of fire hoses and police dogs," says former Jacksonville State University Professor Mark Fagan, whose book *"The Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail: Its History and Economic Impact"* was published in 2016 and updated and re-released this year. "He wanted a quality-of-life attraction for


industries and their employees, and a tourism attraction to get people to stop here and spend money instead of just passing through on the way to Florida or New Orleans."

Once the idea was formed, Bronner needed places to build the courses, as well as somebody within the industry to create them. He says he chose the approximate locations simply by sticking pins in a wall map near the cities he thought should be represented on the Trail. "I didn't know the exact site," Bronner says. "I just knew the areas I wanted to be in."

Finding a golf course architect willing to take on such an enormous project was a bit more challenging, and Bronner admits that a few people turned him down. But he found a willing partner in Robert Trent Jones, a British-born designer who had worked on more than 500 courses in 35 countries throughout his career.

"If I was going to establish an animal like this in Alabama," Bronner says of the Trail concept, "then I needed somebody with credibility in the world of golf. Bobby had just finished a project in Florida. I went and looked at it and said, 'Let's try to get him.' What did we have to lose?"

Jones accepted, though he was 84 years old at the time and unable to handle some



of the on-site work involved in creating even a single golf course, let alone seven at one time. So, he enlisted a younger course architect, Roger Rulewich, for assistance. Then, as Fagan puts it, Bronner gave the duo "a canvas so they could do their artistry."

In 2012, during an event at the RTJ Oxmoor Valley site in Birmingham marking the 20th anniversary of the Trail's opening, Rulewich recounted how the project formulated quickly, and progressed into a rare opportunity for elaborate creativity from the course designers.

"I was over in Ireland at the time," Rulewich said, "and I get a call from Bobby and he says, 'There's something going on in Alabama, I think you'd better get there." So, I came directly here, met Bobby, and he took me out to this very site.



"The way we worked with this project was probably what every golf course architect would like to do but never gets a chance to. We scratched out a road for these golf courses, then we walked them, staked them, adjusted them, changed them. Bobby and I probably did 99 percent of all the markings to decide where these holes were going to go, and then it was free-form from there.

"We weren't working off the detail and the planning that we would normally see on a golf course. We did what we wanted to do, and we adjusted everything to what we thought was the way it should be done. We sort of did this by the seat of our pants. We built holes that we wanted to build. We built ponds, dams. Whatever hazards we wanted were available to us." And all this happened at a rapid pace. The first four courses opened in 1992, a mere two years after Bronner initially contacted Jones, and three more followed in 1993. The Trail was so expansive and different that it gained national and even global attention. It also became the hot property to have in Alabama. "As word started getting out how popular they were," Fagan says, "communities around the state wanted one of these golf courses."


So, courses were added in four more locations: Prattville, Point Clear (at the Grand Hotel), Muscle Shoals and Hoover. But expansion lost steam after Jones passed away in 2000. Still, by that time, the RTJ Golf Trail was firmly established as one of Alabama's premier attractions.

"It can be very difficult to do things that take longer than a week or two to develop,"Bronner says. "When you elect politicians, you want them to get rid of 20 years of errors in an hour and a half, but it can't be done. You have to go step-by-step.

"We're just part of the big puzzle. You need politicians, mayors, economic development people. But you also have to have something to sell to industry and tourism to get them to come here. When Mercedes and the other automotive companies started coming here (in the 1990s), I saw the impact the Trail could have. I think it has made a positive difference in Alabama."

MORE THAN THREE DECADES AFTER THE ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF TRAIL OPENED TO BURNISH THE STATE'S REPUTATION, GOLF TOURISM FLOURISHES IN "SWEET HOME ALABAMA."



Change in golf, like life, does not always come easy. For example, changing a golf swing takes time, effort and the right plan. But changing a public perception requires even more-creativity, commitment, and some guts. In an attempt to augment its tourism dollars in the early 1990s, Alabama state tourism bureau officials looked to golf to draw more out-of-state visitors, and now golf travelers from all over the world reap the benefits.

The effort was born out of racial controversy. Public backlash arose surrounding the 1990 PGA Championship at Shoal Creek Golf and Country Club in Birmingham due to the club's exclusionary membership policies, and the tournament was nearly moved. In the aftermath, the state made a bold commitment to constructing the Robert Trent Jones (RTJ) Golf Trail—an unprecedented effort to build numerous public courses simultaneously throughout the state—and now Alabama is a coveted golf destination for its courses on and off the Trail.

DIGGING IT OUT OF THE DIRT

Although the RTJ Golf Trail traverses the length and breadth of Alabama, its origin has roots in Minnesota. Dr. David G. Bronner (who grew up in Austin, Minnesota, and graduated from then-Mankato State University) has been CEO of the Retirement Systems of Alabama for 50 years, and in 1990 was looking for a way to diversify the investment of state retirement funds and help rehabilitate the state's image through golf. He became motivated by the famous "Field of Dreams" quote, "if you build it [they] will come," and sought out a big-name course architect to build his "links of dreams."

Bronner's idea of building numerous public courses at the same time was laughed at by some architects—and turned down by both Arnold Palmer's and Jack Nicklaus' design firms—as he crisscrossed the state searching for suitable sites and acquiring land. But Robert Trent Jones, Sr., nearing the end of his career, signed on to the project, which opened with seven golf facilities in 1992. With Jones in failing health, his longtime associate Roger Rulewich did a lot of the design on the fly, formulating the holes to what the landforms offered and creating a vast array of unique golf.

"Most of it was site design. We would drive from site to site, designing holes as we went," Rulewich said in The Trail Guide 25, a quarter century anniversary publication. "It might sound crazy, but it was the greatest way in the world to work. It was very free-form."

Between 1992 and 1993, all 11 Trail sites opened their doors. Since that time, numerous other non-Trail, high-end public courses have sprung up across Alabama to take advantage of all the visitors. Now in its 31st year, the Trail courses host 750,000 rounds per year, with 50% of them played by golfers from outside the state.

"All of these people, many of them golfers, were driving like hell through Alabama, mostly going to Florida," Bronner told the anniversary publication. "Our mission was to divert them. So far, I think, we've done pretty well."

TRAIL MIX

The RTJ concept was unique for its time (inspiring other such "trails" in its wake), yet executed brilliantly. The Trail attracts significant tourism beyond golf and has helped change the state's image to one of welcoming hospitality. The Trail courses spread from the northern border of the state to the southern Gulf Coast, averaging a 1.5-to 2-hour drive time between locations, and typical green fees (including cart) are \$69 (\$54 during the summer and winter months). So, the Trail won't empty your wallet and will make 36 holes per day split between two different locations an achievable goal.

Alabama may surprise the uninitiated with its topography as verdant valleys, rolling hills and deep woods bracket the byways from the north to the beautiful and shimmering Gulf Coast. An RTJ Golf Trail tour can begin in any region in the state, and ours started at the northernmost course and headed clockwise southeastward. Here's a sampling of what we found on the Trail.

THE SHOALS (OPENED 2004)

Located by the wide and beautiful Tennessee River, The Shoals (located







in Florence), with its two impressive championship tracks—Fighting Joe and the Schoolmaster—is the perfect opener to RTJ golf. Fighting Joe tops out at 8,092 yards and offers expansive, manicured fairways and large, true-rolling bentgrass greens to soften the challenge. It's a longhitters course (all of 78.6/146 slope rating from the tips) with everything set out in front of the golfer on six sets of tees; the challenge is choosing the right length for reaching your target to score.

Meanwhile, the Schoolmaster may be a bit shorter in length (7,921 yards), but it's narrower with more demanding approaches and certainly ratchets up the challenge (77.6/l48 slope rating). The views along the way can be breathtaking with a beautiful waterfall guarding the second green and a captivating view of the Tennessee River from the bluffs on No. 18.

Likewise, the expansive vista near the 18th green on Fighting Joe—called by one local with a vested interest "the best view on the RTJ Trail"—should not be missed. It is hard to argue with him as the wide Tennessee River viewed from the clubhouse balcony rolls effortlessly by and belies the frenetic challenge found just yards away.

HAMPTON COVE (1992)

One of the original seven RTJ sites, Hampton Cove now features 54 holes across three courses meandering through the low and highlands of the area. Each of the three courses has its own distinct personality. The Highlands (7,428 yards; 76.2/143), boasting vistas on par with the Shoals', traverses the rolling terrain through long, waving grasses and bentgrass greens. The picturesque old mule barn that perfectly frames the fifth hole will likely end up in a frame on your mantle for a quick mental trip back to the Trail.

The River course snakes through the lowlands of former soybean fields of the Flint River flood plains. Water is a theme, as it comes into play on 16 holes of this fun and playable track. It is known as the only RTJ course in the world designed without a bunker, but with all the water (threatening occasionally on both sides of the fairway), a little sand might be a welcome relief. Hit it straight, and the River course (7,668 yards; 77.5/140) can be managed. The Short Course (3,635 yards; par 54) is "links-like and open" and has water in play on 11 of 18 holes. It features four sets of tees, and with the forward Teal tees set at 1,861 yards, players of all skill levels can enjoy golfing atHampton Cove.

SILVER LAKES (1993)

Silver Lakes is something to behold. It has three different regulation nine-hole courses, plus the Short Course (1,994 yards; par 27) around Lee's Lake. With huge elevation changes and spectacular views, every hole offers a new and exciting challenge. For this golfer who was experiencing back spasms, Backbreaker (3,849 yards) was no place to get healthy. And you better come to the other two nines—Mindbreaker (3,814 yards) and Heartbreaker (3,642 yards) with your head and heart intact.

Set in the Appalachian foothills, Silver Lakes will stick with you long after your final putt. The nines are diverse in topography-the wide fairways and tough greens of Backbreaker, significant elevation changes and dramatic lake views of Heartbreaker and the sanctuary-like wooded nine of Mindbreaker with its shorter holes punctuated by trees and wetlands. According to the starter at Backbreaker, "Silver Lakes is the best course on the Trail!" So, pick your "trail" (Backbreaker/Mindbreaker back tees: 76.2/147; Mindbreaker/ Heartbreaker: 75.9/146; Heartbreaker/Backbreaker: 76.7/142), and enjoy the hike.

GRAND NATIONAL (1992)

There are plenty of challenges to that Silver Lakes "best course" claim, and Grand National, voted the No. 1 public golf facility in the country by GolfWorld readers, has to be in the running. In fact, RTJ, upon first setting eyes on the area, said it was the single greatest natural site for building a golf course he had ever seen. Jones did not fail in bringing the golf out of it. Grand National is home to three courses totaling 54 holes. The Links course (7,404yards;75.2/142) is a course with big shoulders. Elevated tees leading to large, raised undulating greens guarded by expansive, facing bunker complexes make the views from the tees and fairways both exciting and intimidating.

The entire Grand National facility is built along the 600-acre Lake Saugahatchee, and the Lake course (7,314 yards;73.9/132), perhaps, benefits the most. With 12 holes hugging the lake shore it well-earns its moniker. Known for its four par 3 holes, the jewel among them is the 230-yard 15th with a memorable island green. And don't overlook the Short Course (3,126 yards; par 54), with more than half its beguiling par 3s touching the lake.

Grand National is grand indeed, and its location near the Georgia border makes for a nice trip-ender before the 90-minute drive to the Atlanta airport hub. Get used to the drive—with all these great courses, you will be back to tour another leg of the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail for more Alabama golf. It's a game-changer.



OR THE TRAIL

Welcome to The Back Yard, where you can enjoy fun, games, camaraderie, and refreshments with friends and family because we've done all the Yard work. Enjoy a drink while sitting around the fire pit in the rocking chairs overlooking the first tee. Yes, it's a golf course, but nothing like anything we've ever built in over 30 years on Alabama's Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail.

Meant to be played in about an hour by a foursome, the nine par 3 holes can play as short as 59 yards, with the longest at 132 yards. Designed as a walking only golf course with no water hazards and just a handful of bunkers, even the most novice golfer will enjoy their experience. At the same time, the scratch player will be challenged by interesting and sometimes confounding green designs. Leave your golf bag in the car and grab your putter, a couple of wedges, and maybe a short iron because that's all you'll need to enjoy *The Back Yard*.

The Trail hosts golfers from all over the world, and it is always our goal to make memorable experiences for our guests. Of course, when we get it right, we like to hear about it. So when we received the kind of positive feedback we got from these Trail guests, we felt the need to share.


I made an ad that played all over the country about 2013 and was featured in a full-page ad in the Trail Guide the following year. What wonderful experiences I had!!







Known by avid golfers as one of the most beautiful and challenging stops on the Trail, Cambrian Ridge in Greenville lies just 40 miles from Montgomery. It is well worth the ride for any golfer looking for 27 holes of jaw-dropping golf. Since being named by *Golf Digest* as the third best new public course in America in 1994, Cambrian Ridge has not rested on its laurels. 2016 saw the culmination of a three-year total renovation of the original 27 championship holes set upon the most



spectacular setting for golf in the entire state of Alabama.

The **Loblolly** and **Sherling** nines were completed in 2013 and 2014. The **Canyon** nine redesign and reconstruction were completed in 2016. The greens have been redesigned to accommodate the higher greens speeds associated with our installation of the latest generation of Ultradwarf Bermuda grass. Additionally, many of the holes have been redesigned to open up views of Sherling Lake and deliver a challenging test of golf while providing players of all skill levels a variety of ways to play each hole and enjoy the experience.



Named the #2 public golf facility in the country by *Golf World* readers, Capitol Hill continues to get praise from golfers and golf writers alike. *GOLF Magazine* called the Judge Course one of the 10 public courses in America worthy of hosting the U.S. Open while the Senator was named among the Top 10 New Courses in the nation by *GOLF Magazine* and continues to host the LPGA's Epson Tour Guardian Championship each year.

Located in Prattville, just 8 miles north of Alabama's state capitol, Capitol Hill features three 18-hole championship courses with more than 1,500 acres of golf and nature. The magnitude of this facility allows each course to be drastically different from the others. Capitol Hill also



features an innovative 360 degree driving range 400 yards in diameter.

The **Senator**, a Scottish-Links style course, holds more than 140 pot-hole bunkers and mounds 20 to 40 feet in height, hiding the cart path or any other hole from view. New TifEagle Ultradwarf greens were installed on the Senator Course in 2020. The **Legislator** is a more traditional course, playing in and out of pine trees and along a bluff overlooking the Alabama River. Enjoy the view riding down the "Sky Bridge" for six holes, laid out in a native cypress swamp, as you are led back up the bluff to finish the course at the clubhouse.

The **Judge** offers stunning vistas along 200-acres amongst the backwaters of the

Alabama River. The first tee sits 200 feet above the fairway overlooking the river and the Montgomery skyline. With 14 holes adjoining the water and a bulkheaded island green, the Judge is simply magnificent.



Grand National is built on 600-acre Lake Saugahatchee with 32 of the 54 holes draped along its filigreed shores. National Village, a golfing community on the Trail, is adjacent to these courses. With countless awards and recognition from every major golf publication, Grand National stands out as perhaps the only property in the country to host the following events and tours: NCAA D1 Men's and Women's National Championships; LPGA Tour; Epson Tour (LPGA); Korn Ferry Tour (PGA TOUR); PGA TOUR.



The cornerstone of the complex is the newly renovated **Links Course**, which is without a single weakness. Featuring new tees, bunkers, and the very best TifEagle Ultradwarf greens, the Links Course is a definite must-play along the Trail. The par-4 18th is without a doubt the strongest finishing hole on the Trail. The drive must carry a corner of the lake, while the approach is played to a shallow pedestal green shored up by massive boulders.

With 12 holes hugging the shore, Grand National's **Lake Course** is every bit as scenic as the Links. Not only is the quartet of par threes on the Lake Course as good as any in the nation, the 230-yard, island green 15th may be the single prettiest hole on the Trail. The **Short Course** is a thing of beauty, with more than half the holes touching the lake. Renovated in 2022 to include TifEagle Ultradwarf greens, this 18-hole course of par 3's might be the finest anywhere in the country.

Hampton Cove, the Northern gateway to the Trail, is a 54-hole facility in Huntsville with terrain that drastically changes from one side of the property to the other.

The **Highlands Course** is one of the most picturesque and playable courses

on the Trail. Long waving grasses frame dramatically rolling terrain and beautiful bent grass greens. The old mule barn beside the fifth hole is one of the most recognizable landmarks on the Trail, while the finishing holes are among the most scenic.



Completely different from the Highlands is the **River Course**, the only Robert Trent Jones layout in the world designed without a single bunker. The course is laid out on former soybean fields in the flood plain of the Flint River and is a throwback to the way courses were built long ago, where dirt was merely pushed up to create the greens and tees, leaving all else, including massive oak trees, as is. With water in play on 16 of the 18 holes, the River Course will challenge your shot-making ability. The **Short Course** is open and linkslike, with water in play on 11 holes. It is a

great venue for golfers of all skill levels.

Highland Oaks, located in the southeast corner of Alabama, offers three 9-hole championship courses as well as a 9-hole Short Course. This 36-hole complex features some of the longest and most classically designed holes on the Trail. Each nine has a different personality. **Highlands**, the core nine, is relatively open with several lakes in play. The peninsula green at the par-3 6th has an elusive, beckoning quality.

Marshwood has been made famous (or notorious) by its behemoth par-5 6th, which stretches to 701 yards from the tips.



The 422-yard, par-4 9th is arguably the best hole at the site and has a tilted green elevated above a swath of wetlands.

The **Magnolia** nine is well-named: specimen magnolia trees dot the higher ground, reached via a 1,000-foot long wooden bridge spanning a marsh filled with lichen-dappled trees. The feature hole is the 416-yard 5th, where a split-level fairway offers an option off the tee.

The recently renovated **Short Course**, a 9-hole par-3 designed to accommodate players of all levels, received TifEagle Ultradwarf greens in 2024. The championship nines were given TifEagle Ultradwarf greens in 2020, along with a redesign of the practice area with new short game and putting greens.

The **Dogwood Course**, which recently hosted the 59th U.S. Women's Senior Amateur Championship, was completely renovated in 2018, while the **Azalea** **Course** was renovated in November 2019. The new designs feature gorgeous TifEagle Ultradwarf greens that lend themselves to superb year-round conditions. The Lakewood Club has been named several times to *GOLF Magazine's* "Best Golf Resorts in America." **The Experience** is a 15-acre, state-ofthe-art practice facility offering a beautiful and innovative social setting to work on all aspects of your game.



The new Magnolia Grove features two renovated golf courses. Each championship course received extensive upgrades in recent years. Golfers will find more "player friendly" qualities without compromising the integrity of Robert Trent Jones' original design. Magnolia Grove, the most southern location on Alabama's Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail, was recently named

one of the "Top 50 Public Courses" by *Golf World Magazine* readers. The Crossings and Falls courses are also listed in *Golf Digest's* "Places to Play" as two of the nation's Great Value courses and as "America's Top 50 Affordable Courses."

The topography at Magnolia Grove features creeks, marshland, and lakes with each of the 54 holes carved through



indigenous hardwood and pine. The **Crossings Course**, which has hosted both the LPGA Tour and the Korn Ferry Tour Championship, provides an open parklandtype ambiance. Several water features and crushed oyster shell waste areas were added to provide an exciting new look. All 18 feature the acclaimed Mini Verde Ultradwarf greens. The renovated **Falls Course** reopened in October 2010 as the only par-71 golf course on the Trail. The Falls is characterized by large, liberally contoured Mini Verde greens and massive cloverleaf bunkers. Several holes were entirely redesigned, giving the course a brand-new look.

Golf Digest has named the **Short Course** at Magnolia Grove as the

best par-3 course in America. Recently renovated, it features all-new putting surfaces with Champion Ultradwarf Bermuda grass. This course is as good as any collection of one-shotters on a championship course.

Centrally located in the state and just minutes from the newly revitalized downtown Birmingham area, this 45-hole facility was built on former mining land owned by U.S. Steel. Sculpted from the peaks and valleys of the Appalachians, the courses offer scenic forests, numerous creeks, and challenging elevation changes. The **Ridge Course** offers numerous elevation changes, heavy tree cover, and is incredibly photogenic. As a tribute to the area's mining past, the green at the par-5 3rd hole is buttressed by a shelf of exposed shale rock.

Completely renovated in 2021, the **Valley Course** features new tees, bunkers, and



beautiful TifEagle greens. For those who have played the Valley in the past, there are also a few new surprises out there with complete redesigns on a few holes, including the previously notorious 18th hole.

The Back Yard, opened in 2022, is a collection of fun, interesting holes that feature accessible but challenging hole locations. This 9-hole par-3 course is where you gather for fun, friendship, and cocktails. Enjoy a drink while sitting around the fire pit in rocking chairs overlooking the 1st tee and the 2nd and 9th greens.

Meant to be played in about an hour by a foursome, The Back Yard is designed with no water hazards and just a handful of bunkers so that even the most novice golfer will enjoy their experience. At the same time, the scratch player will be challenged by interesting and sometimes confounding green designs.

Beautifully carved into the rolling terrain of Shannon Valley, the scope of this property will amaze even the most-traveled golfer. Ross Bridge was named one of the top golf resorts in North America by *GOLF Magazine* in 2019 and has been a favorite of *Golf Digest* editors for the past five years.

The course meanders through indigenous landscape and around the

259-room Renaissance Birmingham Ross Bridge Golf Resort & Spa. **Ross Bridge** is the fifth-longest course in the world but offers multiple tees for golfers of all levels. Symbolic of an old parkland-style course, ten holes play along the banks of two significant lakes connected by a spectacular waterfall dropping 80 feet between the 9th and 18th greens. A gristmill added to the waterfall



reflects the history of this old mining site. The beauty and challenge of each hole leads many to believe there is not one signature hole but possibly eighteen.

Recently renovated in 2023, the course features new TifEagle UltraDwarf Bermuda grass greens, newly constructed bunkers, and several architectural changes that improve overall playability and accessibility. The par-3 14th hole features a new ribbon bunker atop the greenside retaining wall and will challenge the scenic 18th hole for signature hole recognition.

From multiple high points on the course, you can see the picturesque view of the 9th and 18th holes with a waterfall tumbling between. The 7th hole offers a par five that traverses a ridge high above the rest of the course. The 9th will leave you speechless as it is time to decide how daring you are off the tee. A split fairway allows for either a short challenging route along the water's edge or opt for safer play leaving a longer, more difficult approach to the green.



The **Fighting Joe Course** at The Shoals opened August 2004 and was the first Trail course to break 8,000 yards, measuring some 8,092 yards from the black tees. Bordered by dunes-like mounds and tall grasses, Fighting Joe, with wide fairways and beautifully maintained bent grass greens, can play long if you play the wrong set of tees, but this course is simply good, straightforward golf. You can see where you're going. The question is...can you get there?

Some say the spectacular 17th hole is the signature hole on the course, but the 18th green overlooking Wilson Lake on




the Tennessee River will distract you with its beauty, if not its treachery. Long-hitters here will experience a test of champions, but from the correct tee box, all players will enjoy world-class golf.

The **Schoolmaster Course** may be a tougher course than Fighting Joe, but

only time will tell. One thing's for sure, it's a shot-maker's golf course with narrower fairways, demanding approaches to wellprotected bent grass greens, and still a length of nearly 8,000 yards! It's hard to beat the beauty that the 18th hole holds on the high bluffs over the river, but the waterfall guarding the 2nd green sure comes close. Make sure you've done your homework well, for the Schoolmaster will certainly test all of your skills.

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Few Alabamians are known by only one name, but very few can command the international reputation of the artist Nall. Born Fred Nall Hollis in Troy in 1948, he created art in a variety of genres for more than 50 years, from paintings, mosaics, and line engravings to sculpture, glassware, and jewelry. He grew up in Troy and earned a degree in art, political science, and abnormal psychology from the University of Alabama. He studied at the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris and was mentored by Salvador Dali. His work has been exhibited in France, Italy, Switzerland, New York, Miami, and many other museums, and he wa an artist in residence at the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa, Miami-Dade College, and Troy University. After living several years in France and setting up his N.A.L.L. Art Foundation for students, he returned to Alabama, opening a studio in Fairhope. As part of a massive transformation in 2018, the Grand Hotel added a Nall Suite and a connecting gallery overlooking the historic main lobby. Other new pieces are in guest rooms and throughout the resort. He has a permanent art gallery in the NALL Museum at the International Arts Center on the Troy campus. **To learn more visit artistnall.com.**

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
